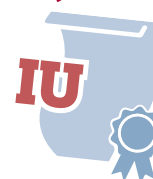

Careers

We don't just prepare students to excel in education - we also help them find jobs! Our Career Connections team provides both professional development programming and job search services. Enroll in our Profession Distinction series of courses so you can earn credit while you achieve career readiness or complete our Educator Wellbeing Distinction series to focus on developing skills to support your own wellbeing. We offer career coaching, resume and interview assistance, our workshop series, and three signature job/career fairs to help students connect with employers from around the country.



Scholarships

All incoming freshman admitted to Indiana University will have the opportunity to apply for all IU scholarships through the Office of Scholarships. Current School of Education upper-class students can be considered for scholarships based on the completion of our annual application.



Student Teaching

Our student-teaching philosophy is simple: **the more time you spend in real classrooms, the better.**

Through service learning opportunities students get to work with youth in various community Agencies as early as their first semester. Early field experiences involve working beside experienced Educators during methods blocks early in the teacher education program. Because of this wealth of Experience, our graduates are extremely well-prepared as they begin their careers, as evidenced by the 95% of candidates who have met state licensure requirements over the last four years.

Students spend 12-18 weeks in full-time supervised classroom instruction. In-state students can return to their home districts. Out-of-state students are assigned to an In-state location usually in the local area.

OUT OF STATE?

Most states allow holders of an Indiana state teaching license to begin teaching immediately while they work towards earning their certificate or license for that state.



GLOBAL GATEWAY FOR TEACHERS



The rigid structure of most teacher education programs makes it difficult to take part in traditional study-abroad or off-campus internships. Global Gateway for Teachers provides students invaluable intercultural immersion experiences while also fulfilling their student teaching requirements.

Gain experience as a teacher while immersing in a different culture. This unique program provides classroom and community experiences for student teachers in culturally diverse settings in three distinct programs:

OVERSEAS

Start with a minimum of 10 weeks student teaching in Indiana, and then spend 8 or more weeks teaching in Australia, Costa Rica, Ecuador, England, France, Germany, Ghana, Greece, India, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Mexico, New Zealand, Northern Ireland, Norway, Scotland, Spain, Tanzania, or Wales.

NEW FOR CASS MAJORS: Three-week school-based immersion experiences in New Zealand!

NAVAJO NATION

Spend 16 weeks student teaching in the Navajo Nation in Arizona, New Mexico, or Utah.

URBAN

Spend a full semester of student teaching and living in Chicago city schools and neighborhoods.

In all of our Global Gateway programs, you'll engage in community-based study and service, and build connections with the families served by your school.



WHAT?

Degree Options:

Make a difference from your first day on the job. A four-year college plan of 120 credits requires completion of 15 credits each semester. Professional education courses are taken in three to five semester blocks, including student teaching.

PRE-SCHOOL AND ELEMENTARY (GRADES P TO 6)



Early Childhood Education

- *Teaching All Young Learners (TAYL)*

Leads to a license to teach infant/toddler preschool programs and grades K-3 with an emphasis in child development, family-centered practices, and special education.

Time in Field – Experience and Student Teaching: 715 Hours

Elementary Education

Leads to a generalist license to teach in grades K-6

Time in Field – Experience and Student Teaching: 750 Hours

Special Education/Elementary Education

- *Teaching All Learners (TAL)*

Leads to a dual teaching license for generalist and exceptional needs, mild intervention teaching in grades K-6.

Time in Field – Experience and Student Teaching: 1,120Hours

Students enrolled in one of these 3 programs will also earn a Literacy License addition.

SECONDARY (MIDDLE, JUNIOR HIGH AND HIGH SCHOOL: GRADES 5 TO 12)



Secondary Education

Subject areas: Journalism, Language Arts/English, Mathematics, Science (Chemistry, Earth-Space Science, Life Science/Biology, or Physics) and Social Studies.

Time in Field – Experience and Student Teaching: 600 Hours

Special Education/Secondary Education

Teach exceptional needs students, mild intervention

Time in Field – Experience and Student Teaching: 600 Hours



Visual Arts Education

Develop instructional techniques in a variety of artistic media, from painting to computer art
